4. The Columbia Gorge Lioness led by JoAnn Wittenberg, Darla Davis, Karen Peck, Jean McLean, Sandy Place, Darrell Driver, and many other community members have done a wonderful job with this year's Festival of Lights. It's expected to be better than ever.

The event will take place at the City Hall Gym at 4:30 pm on December 2^{nd} . This is their 5th year for this event and like all these efforts they don't happen without a lot of planning and hard work, and 5 years running is nothing to sneeze at. We are very grateful and it's a wonderful way to kick of the holiday season.

So thanks again for all your tremendous work and dedication. All these activities strengthen the fabric of our community and make this City a place of warmth and fun.

Now let's move to the business of the City.

Bridge of the Gods Resort and Casino. The progress of

this project continues to be delayed by a reluctance in the Department of Interior (DOI) to release the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS). Staff and your elected officials continue to lobby this agency for movement but it's proving to be a long hill.

Our latest effort is to invite Carl Artman, the undersecretary to the Department of Interior who actually signs the DEIS for release, to visit Cascade Locks and the Hood River Trust lands owned by the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs.

Once again we feel we have a compelling case for this project especially when one considers the alternative that Warm Springs could build something on their Hood River land. The tentative time for this visit is in December and we will continue to push other angles to dislodge our project from this road block.

Thank you for your patience and we'll keep you posted as new developments arise.

Columbia Cascade Housing Corporation (CCHC) Project

After review of its options, CCHC has verbally decided on re-applying to construct a new 20 unit work force housing project on the McCoy Meadows it purchased in 2006.

While nothing is official until they have actually submitted an application, they have communicated that they intend to do so.

Of course, they plan on addressing all the discrepancies identified in the LUBA (Land Use Board of Appeals) appeal and the public will have many opportunities to comment as this project moves forward.

Emergency Services Center (Fire hall) Project

This project continues to move along steadily and since the last newsletter several key milestones have been met.

The City completed the Environmental Review with the State and has been authorized for full use of CDBG funding.

The plans and specifications for the project are almost done and will soon be making their way to the bid process.

The City and Council held one community meeting and three public hearing sessions to discuss the parameters for selling the existing fire hall property.

Finally the logging contract is almost complete that is required before construction may start.

Under the latest time line we hope to go to bid in December and bring a bid award recommendation to the Council in Jan '08. I know this has been a long road but we can finally see the light at the end of the tunnel. It's very exciting to finally have this decision before the City and the Council. Please stay tuned for the Council meeting to advertise for the construction of this project.

Southbank Undergrounding Project

As many of you are aware the City provides power along I-84 outside it's city limits and maintains the electric utility lines for about 18 miles beginning about 1 mile from our western city limits.

Because all this infrastructure is overhead and in a well forested, power outage rich environment the cost of maintaining these lines is substantial.

Furthermore the revenue generated from this infrastructure is very limited due to the significant development restrictions in the National Scenic Area. While the City is not able to address the development restrictions we can significantly address the maintenance requirements by undergrounding this infrastructure.

With this goal in mind, over the past few years the City has successfully lobbied the federal and state government for funding to do this work and in October the City completed its first 2.1 miles of Undergrounding along Southbank for a total cost of about \$280,000. The majority of that money came from Federal sources.

The next undergrounding project is titled Segment A and will span four miles east of Multnomah Falls .

The City has about \$1.5 million to do this work and will be partnering with the Oregon Department of Transportation for its execution, a requirement with these types of federal funds. The next 12 months will be spent conducting numerous biological and environmental assessments, obtaining easements, Right of Way permits, and drafting the designs, specifications, and plans for the actual work.

If all this work is completed in a timely manner, we could begin under-grounding this next four miles in December '08 - another significant milestone in reducing the City's maintenance costs and increasing its reliability along this portion of our infrastructure.

ODOT East Gateway Entrance Project

This project was completed October 31st per its contract and is now ready to receive visitors traveling along the Historical Columbia River Highway.

As a review this was one portion of a larger ODOT Sights and Signs project along the entire Historic Columbia River Highway. Cascade Lock's portion of this project was 100% funded with Federal funds to an amount of \$466,000.

The project's improvements included new sidewalks, streetlights, landscaping including several dozen trees, two interpretative signs, one way pavement and traffic flow and the creation of 23 parking spots, two RV spots, two disabled persons spots, and a bike rack.

This portion of the project serves as Phase 1 for this part of town and Phase 2 will be the establishment of restroom facilities, possibly a visitor's center, picnic tables and a few other amenities. Finally, the City and the State plan to formally celebrate this project with a ribbon cutting ceremony on November 30th, at 2:00 pm on sight, rain or shine. The event will include warm beverages and light refreshments and all are welcome to attend.

Thanks again for all your support and I look forward to an exciting winter both inside and outside City Hall.

WILDFIRE REDUCTION PLAN & GRANT BY JIM HULBERT

It's been slightly more than four years since the major wildfire which affected the City in September of 2003 occurred.

Since that time the City has taken an active role to reduce the potential for another such event, and to prepare residents for one, if it were to occur. Since the wildfire happened, the City has completed a Community Wildfire Protection Plan which identifies high risk areas in the community. The plan further displays several mitigation measures that, if implemented, would help reduce the potential for another such fire.

Last year the City applied for, and received, a grant from the Forest Service to help residents reduce wildfire hazard fuels around their homes. Money from this grant has been used to treat more than 40 residential properties in the City with the objective of reducing hazard fuels and making the properties safer from the threat of wildfires. The grant can be used to pay for up to 90 percent of the cost of hazard fuel treatment. In most cases the treatment consists of brush removal or the pruning of trees around the residential lot. The program is ongoing and anyone can apply for assistance under it. To be eligible, it must be determined that the property could benefit from a wildfire hazard reduction standpoint.

To be considered for assistance under the grant program, please contact Darla Davis at City Hall, (541) 374-8484. If you do apply for assistance your property will be evaluated to see if it meets the criteria for the program. If it does, a City representative will identify what needs to be done to reduce the wildfire risk. Once an agreement is signed outlining project requirements, you will hire a contractor to complete the work, or agree to do the work yourself. When the work is complete and approved by a City representative, the City will reimburse you for the agreed upon amount.

The grant to the City is available until July of 2008. Owners of larger tracts of land without homes on it may also apply for assistance under a similar program administered by the Oregon Department of Forestry. METER ACCESSIBILITY REQUIRED

The electric meters are read each month, usually starting on the 19th (or the next working day if the 19th falls on a weekend or holiday) and lasting four days. Normally the service area west of town (Warrendale, Dodson and Bridal Veil, and the east end of the service area (Wyeth) are read the first day. The second day, will cover the industrial area and begin the eastern residential area. The third day will include the residential districts near the west end of Forest Lane and behind the old Texaco station. The fourth day will include the area south of City Hall, the business district and residential sections to the Bridge of the Gods. The areas being read on a certain day can change due to weather or other variables. If you want to know which day your meter is usually read, please call City Hall.

Problems arise when the meter reader isn't able to get to the meter. New fences and brush or debris piled in front of the meter have caused problems in the past, but by far the biggest problem has been dogs. Animals should never be chained to or within reach of the meter base. In these cases, the dog does not necessarily have to act in a threatening manner to be a deterrent. A dog doesn't have to be large to be a threat either. Small dogs can be just as determined to protect their property as large dogs and can inflict painful bites. Even an overly friendly dog can be cause for alarm if one is not familiar with it. If the meter reader is at all unsure of the dog for any reason, he will not attempt to read the meter at that time.

According to City Council policy that was established on September 14, 1987, if a dog, or any other obstacle, prevents the reading of the meter at the scheduled time, a certified letter will be sent to the owner to make an appointment for a time when the owner will be home to control the dog and the City employee can return to read the meter safely. A \$25.00 fee will be assessed in this situation.

Please remember that Hood River County Ordinance No. 123, which the City has adopted, prohibits dogs from being "at large" and provides penalties for such behavior. If your dog is loose, and prevents the reading of your meter or anyone else's meter, you will be subject to penalties of both the City's meter accessibility requirements and the County's animal at large penalties.

People and their pets enjoy special relationships and, while Rover or Lassie would never bite or maul you, he/ she may not have the same perspective about the meter reader. Please be aware of your pet's whereabouts and activities at all times, but particularly during meter reading time each month.

WINTER WEATHERIZATION TIPS BY BRUCE BILODEAU

Making homes more energy-efficient is a way to save on your energy bills. The investment of an hour with a caulking gun and some extra insulation will pay off for you, as a homeowner.

Some easy ways to save:

Add weather stripping and caulking to doors and windows. As much as 30 to 40 percent of a home's energy load is attributed to outside air penetrating the house.

- Add weather stripping tapes that adhere directly to door or window frames for a tight seal.
- Fit foam or rubber weather stripping into the gaps around your doors or windows.
- Install rubber or foam bottom seals under doors.
- Add a door sweep to seal the gap at the bottom of a door from drafts.
- Change disposable air filters in your furnace two or three times a year.
- Have your furnace inspected by a professional at least once a year.
- Check for appropriate insulation around the pipes, walls, attic and floor. Choose the right R-value, which is a measure of insulating power. Higher R-values mean greater insulating power, which provides greater household energy savings and cost savings.
- Turn down the water heater's thermostat setting about 120 degrees and switch to "vacation" setting when you'll be away for a few days.
- When washing clothes, use warm or cold water not hot and rinse with cold water.
- Install a low flow showerhead.
- Showers use less hot water than baths.
- Use a programmable thermostat. Set at 68° during the day, 65° at night and 55° when no one is home.
- Close off unoccupied rooms and close heating vents.
- Use exterior doors farthest from the thermostat.
- Use the sunlight to warm rooms. Close drapes and blinds at night to retain heat.
- Wear more layers of clothing and warmer, insulated clothing while indoors.
- Put extra blankets or a down comforter on the bed.
- Make sure that dishwashers, washing machines and dryers are fully loaded before running.
- When it's time to replace appliances, choose those with high-energy efficiency ratings.
- Install storm or thermal windows and doors.

Over the years the Hood River County Library System has thoroughly enjoyed serving your dynamic information needs. As our community rapidly changes and grows we will continue to inform you of all the great library services available in the area. We would like to highlight a wonderful library who offers their superb services to you as well, The Oregon State Library.

Oregon State Library (Talking Books and Braille Services)

Do you or someone you know have difficulty reading print? The Oregon State Library administers a program called Talking Book and Braille Services (TBABS). The program offers unabridged audio books, newspaper services, Web-Braille books, and descriptive videos. TBABS now offers downloadable audio books, which are downloaded to your computer via the Internet. To avail yourself of this service you must have a compatible computer with an Internet connection.

TBABS offers free talking newspaper subscriptions. By placing a toll free telephone call you will have access to over 230 newspapers (including several in the Spanish language). Of local interest are the Oregonian, the Statesman Journal, and the Oregon Associated Press newswire. Web-Braille books are available to library users with Braille embossers, refreshable Braille displays, and other Braille-aware devices. Web-Braille is an Internet, web-based service that provides, in an electronic format, many Braille books, some music scores, and all the Braille magazines produced by the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. TBABS has over 400 Descriptive Video titles. Descriptive videos play in any VCR, but they have a special soundtrack that describes the visual elements of the movie.

The Mid Columbia Action (CAP) office serving Wasco, Hood River and Sherman counties will be making appointments for this winter's heating assistance starting December 3, 2007. You need to contact the office nearest to you to set up an appointment. The Hood River Office is located at 205 Oak Street #4 and the telephone number is 541-386-4027.

Energy Assistance Program eligibility is based on household size and income:

Maximum Annual
\$19,327.00
\$25,274.00
\$31,220.00
\$37,167.00
\$43,114.00

At the time of your appointment you will need to bring the following items:

- Income verification for the past 30 days, if you do not receive food stamps.
- Your last heating bill.

NOTE: If anyone in the house is 60 years or older, or disabled, you may apply for assistance now.



HAVE IT YOUR WAY! CATV & BROADBAND

Now you can get the City's CATV and Broadband services in any combination you want. If you want BB without the full CATV, we can do that, and we're going to throw in CH 23 (local info) for free!

You can get special reduced rates for Broadband (BB) connects if you sign up before December 16th. For instance, service connections for BB with CH 23, or CH 23 alone, to the first CATV jack and the first computer service at new locations will be only \$50.00 (normally \$100.00). At locations where wiring for those services already exist, the connect fee will be only \$25.00 (normally \$35.00).

Since there are so many variables that may affect connections, please call City Hall for information about connect rates for your specific situation. We will schedule the connections to be done on a couple of different days. So call early to get on the schedule.

The deadline for the special connect rates is 5:00 PM, Friday, December 14th.

RE-OCCURING ORDINANCE VIOLATIONS BY OEO SHOWN OSBOURN

I have taken the top 5 re-occurring ordinance violations and split the City into 4 zones:

Zone 1 Bridge of the Gods to School Rd

Zone 2 School Rd to Hammond St.

Zone 3 Hammond St. to Herman Creek Lane

Zone 4 Herman Creek Lane to Government Island

Each week I will patrol a different zone focusing on 1 of the 5 most re-occurring violations.

Each month I will focus on a different violation or any non-compliance violations from the previous month.

Written complaints will take first priority over my daily patrols. The top re-occurring violations are Abandoned Vehicles, Obstructing Right of Way, Unlawful Parking, Public Nuisance (Junk) and Public Nuisance (Vegetation).
